Public Works Day (K-8th grade)

On May 14, 2015, the Public Works Department will once again open its yard at 1820 Roosevelt Boulevard for an open house geared specifically for elementary- and middle school-age children. Public Works Day gives students and teachers a behind-the-scenes look at the many ways public works serves our community through parks and natural areas, the airport, wastewater treatment, engineering, and maintenance. Guided tours offered. Attendees get to climb aboard and explore large pieces of equipment, have fun with handson activities, and learn as staff demonstrate the use of specialized equipment.

Snow Plow Art (K-6th grade)


Once a year, the Public Works Department works with the Bethel and 4J school districts to pick one elementary school from each district to participate in a snowplow art event. In mid-April, Public Works drops off an 11-foot-wide plow blade at a location determined by the school or the district. Students at the school then paint the blade, using paint and brushes supplied by Public Works. When the blade has been painted, Public Works brings it to the Public Works Yard. The painted blades are displayed at Public Works Day in May. Public Works also publicizes the artwork in the City Council newsletter and through community news and press



releases. The painted blades are used for normal public works operations, including snow removal. Each year the artwork is "recycled" to provide a fresh canvas for the next art project.

Outdoor Field Trips in Eugene

Skinner Butte Summit Trail (K-5th grade)

A new path has been created leading to the summit of Skinner Butte in the heart of Eugene. Kids are invited to learn along the way about native plants and trees, the early history and namesake of Skinner Butte and the wildlife that call the area home. The short walk starts at RiverPlay Playground and winds its way up to a rewarding view of Eugene. Bus parking is available at the west end of Skinner Butte near the I-105 Bridge.

Delta Ponds Tour (K-12th grade)

Students are invited to visit and learn more about the 150-acre Delta Ponds Natural Area right in the heart of Eugene. Once an abandoned 1950s gravel mine, the site has been turned into a thriving habitat for diverse fish and wildlife and serves as a large-scale reuse example. Learn more about the animals that live there,



what it took to create the area, and why it was important to connect the ponds with the Willamette River in order to provide vital habitat for juvenile Chinook salmon, American beaver, western pond turtle, river otter, and neo-tropical migratory birds. Tours can be customized for K-12 grade levels and class focus, and complement the City of Eugene Stormwater Program Delta Ponds grades 1, 2 and 5 classroom activities. The site includes accessible walking trails and convenient car and bus parking along Goodpasture Island Road.



Hunting for History Video Series (3rd-4th grade)

In celebration of Eugene's 150th birthday in 2012, the City of Eugene developed a series of short videos highlighting different aspects of the city's history. The "Hunting for History" series includes:

- "Skinner's Donation Land Claim"
- "Eugene's Historic Trees"
- "Eugene's Graveyard Stories"
- "Eugene's Historical Sculptures"
- "Kalapuya Talking Stones"

Each segment is three to four minutes long and was created with $3^{\rm rd}$ and $4^{\rm th}$ graders in mind as the audience. Each video includes a subject matter expert and references a real, publicly accessible feature that children can see and touch. Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) (7th-12th grade)

Outdoor Environmental Education and Activities (K-12th grade)

Reconnect your students to nature! The River House Outdoor Program specializes in creating field trips that introduce students to wide range outdoor activities while teaching them about environmental concepts, stewardship, leadership skills, and how to be safe and fun in the outdoors. Programs can be adapted to meet specific classrooms needs and utilize nearby natural areas as the temporary classroom. Activities include, but are not limited to rafting, rock climbing, tree climbing, biking, hiking and the challenge course. Program uses environmental curriculum that is aligned with state teaching standards and covers subject areas such as Forest Ecology, Five Senses, Water Cycle, and Winter Survival.

Pedestrian (2nd grade) and Bicycle Safety Classes (5th-6th grade)

Pedestrian Safety classes are geared toward 2nd grade classrooms in the 4J, Bethel, and Springfield districts and are funded through each districts' Safe Routes to Schools program. The course consists of one day in class using a mock road to teach safe pedestrian skills around traffic. The second day is a walk around the school practicing the skills learned.

Bike Safety classes are for 5th or 6th grade classes, generally during P.E. class. The 10 day curriculum includes instruction, safety equipment, and bikes and is funded through each districts' Safe Routes to Schools program. Students learn to be safe and aware when riding on streets. The course is taught through classroom lessons, on-campus drills, and off-campus rides.

Safety Town (pre-K)

Safety Town is an incredible two week comprehensive educational program that introduces pre-Kindergarten children to safety awareness. Children who will enter Kindergarten in the Fall are eligible to attend this summer camp (Sorry, no exceptions). Safety Town is an important experience to help children prepare for their transition to a formal school environment and to make safe decisions as they spend more and more time apart from their parents. This program covers topics such as pedestrian safety, traffic safety, bicycle safety, gun safety, water safety, fire safety, personal safety, poison prevention, water safety, school safety and much, much more! A certified school teacher provides most of the instruction and is supplemented by community experts and police department staff. Applications for campers are generally accepted beginning in early March. Applications for teen volunteers (ages 13-19) are also accepted at that time. Teen applicants undergo an interview process followed by background and reference checks. This is a popular camp that does fill-up. Applications are accepted on a first come, first served basis.
