



Passport to History

Directions for 8 1/2" x 14" (legal size) downloadable copy

1. If possible, print both sides to one piece of paper; if this is not possible, glue the two pages together with top at the same end of each side.
2. Cut the page lengthwise along the dotted line down the center of the paper. You now have two long strips of paper.
3. Cut each strip horizontally, into six small strips, also along the dotted "cut" lines. You now have 12 small strips.
4. Looking at the numbers on the left side of each small strip, find the one with a "2" in the left corner. Now, arrange them so the numbers increase by two's: 4, 6, 8, etc., placing the strip with the larger number on top. The highest number will be 24.
5. Place one staple along the dash line between pages 24 & 25 and fold into a small booklet.
6. Trim uneven pages, if necessary.

Passport to History Rules:

- The Passport to History Contest is open to youth age 12 and younger
- Only one passport per contestant will be accepted.
- Blank passports may be photocopied or duplicated, however, answers to each question must be hand written in original ink or pencil; passports in which the responses that have been photocopied will be disqualified.
- To qualify for the drawing, at least 15 questions must be answered correctly.
- To qualify for the drawing, the contestant's name, address, and phone number must be provided in full on the pages indicated in the passport. Passports in which this information is not legible will be disqualified
- The drawing for the prize (or prizes) will be held and the winner(s) announced at the City of Eugene birthday party to be held on Oct. 20, 2012.

How to Enter:

Children and youth age 12 and younger are invited to discover a little about Eugene's first 150 years with a "Passport to History".

The passports are free and may be picked up at any City community center, pool or Library or at the AAA

The passport includes information about 21 historic sites and objects around Eugene, including the replica of Eugene Skinner's cabin, the Many Nations Longhouse, and the Pioneer Mother statue on the University of Oregon campus. For each one, there is a question asked that can be answered only by visiting the site or object. An address or location is provided for each, which can be visited any day or time.

Once the child has correctly answered at least 15 questions, they can enter a drawing for a valuable prize by turning the completed passport in by Oct. 1 to:

The winner will be announced at the City's birthday party on Oct. 20 at Skinner Butte Park.

There are two grand prizes: an iTouch and a Kindle Fire. There will be additional second and third place prizes.
